ANDREW JACKSON IN DAVIDSON COUNTY COURT - 1789-1791

Early in 1789, a young lawyer named Andrew Jackson, a future general in the War of 1812 and later United States President made his appearance in the courts of Davidson County, at that time a part of North Carolina. On January 5, 1789, the following entry was recorded in County Court Minute Book A for Davidson County:

"Andrew Jackson, Esqr. produced a license to practice as an attorney at law in the severall County Courts in this state and now at this court has taken the oath of an attorney."¹

The following list includes the names of his opposing attorneys, the defendants, plaintiffs, witnesses and jurors who were associated with Andrew Jackson during his first two years in Davidson County Court. Following the alphabetical list of associates is a chart of court cases providing dates, clients, disposition of cases and other interesting data.

NATHAN PEEBLES - War of 1812

Nathan Peebles; Rank: Captain Enlisted: May 1, 1812 under Col. Robert Johnson; Branch: Infantry.

(from records in Tennessee State Library and Archives, Nashville, Tenn.)

Nathan Peoples and Hayden E. Wells, adm. of David Peoples, dec'd Book B, page 374 Wills and Records of Montgomery County, Tennessee. Registered 1816.

Inventory of estate of Agatha Peoples dec. Nathan Peoples and Hayden E. Wells, Adm. Rend Oct. term 1817. (Book B, page 430 Wills and Records, Montgomery Co., TN.) Book C, page 18 Wills and Records, Montgomery Co., Tn: Division of slaves belonging to heirs of David Peoples. Nathan Peoples was one of the heirs.

Deeds prove David Peoples in Montgomery Co. by January 1807. He died by 1816. Names wife, Agathy and children.

There was an administration for Nathan Peoples by October term of Court 1820 in Montgomery County, Tennessee.

Book L, page 93 Pleas and Quarter Sessions of Montgomery County, Tennessee, Court rules in favor of John Rook against David, Wm, Agatha, Burwell, Patsy and Nathan Peoples, dec. Reg. 22 May 1823.

A letter from Mrs. J. Paul Sisk quoting from "Peeples" by Ann Brandbury Peeples: "David Peeples Jr. was born August 31, 1764 Brunswick Co., Va. and died Sept 4, 1816, Montgomery County, Tennessee. Nathan Peeples and Hayden E. Wells were administrators of his estate, as they were for his wife, also, who died the following spring - March 10, 1817. David was married March 20, 1788 Green Co., Ga. to Agatha (Agga) Thornton, daughter of John Thornton. They had nine children, one of whom was Nathan."

COLDER vs COLDER

Wednesday, March 20, 1844.

Be it remembered that this day this cause was heard before the Honorable Andrew McCampbell Chancellor upon the bill being regularly taken for confessed and proof in the cause and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that the defendant WM. A. COLDER did willfully and maliciously abandon and desert the complaintant for more than ten years before the filing of the bill without any just cause and that he still continues that abandonment and desertion.

It is therefore ordered adjudged & decreed that the marriage existing between the complaintant and the defendant heretofore be dissolved, made void and held for nothing and that the said MARGARET J. COLDER be restored to all the rights of a fem sole and that the complainant pay the cost.

COFFIN BOOK OF THOMAS J. FARLEY

Anita Whitefield Darnell

Thomas Farley evidently had a small store. He was a cabinet maker and made coffins for many in his area of the county. I have found stones in Blooming Grove, Liberty, Mt. Pleasant, and family cemeteries which have the same death date as the ones in the coffin book. I have been told by older people that Farley had two white mules which pulled his wagon and thus he conveyed the coffins to the cemeteries acting as undertaker.

Elizabeth and Thomas J. Farley were married May 22, 1834. Thomas J. Farley was born June 1, 1807 and died Sept. 5, 1884. The Farley Cemetery copied by a descendant (Cemetery Records of Montgomery County, Tennessee, Volume 1, p. 36) has to be in error on his death date. The Bible gives T. J. Farley death as 1884, not 1844. Also the last entry in his book is February 1884. Elizabeth Farley was born November 28, 1814 and died August 28, 1891. She made her will July 15, 1890. It was proven September 1, 1891. (Will Book S, page 521).

Pasted in the front of the ledger (Coffin Book): "Letters of Testamony - Montgomery County, Tennessee. To J. P. Howard, a citizen of Montgomery County:

It appearing to the court, that Mrs. Elizabeth Farley has died leaving a written will in which you are appointed executor. 1st September 1891.

The Coffin Book is now in the possession of Joe Howard, Clarksville, TN. Items are copied exactly as written.

Plaintiff to recover damages and costs.

(p. 76) September Term 1819

SUTTON & FURGASON vs GEORGE ROSS & OTHERS

Be it remembered...that on the 25th day of October 1815 was filed in the clerk's office of this court a bill of complaint...as follows:

Humbly sheweth..your orators Jasper Sutton of Murray County and Rogal Fargarson and Elizabeth, his wife, of Humphreys County, that sometime about the begining of the year 1792 their Grand Father Jasper Sutton of the County of Kershaw in the State of South Carolina departed this life, having just made and published his last will and testement and appointed as his executors thereto George Ross, John Chesnut and Jonathan Sutton ...all qualified...

In said will are the following bequests "I give and bequeth unto my Grandson Jasper Sutton son of Richard, one Negro woman named Rose, her son Absalom, and one negro girl named Sibb, daughter of Hannah, and the issue of the females except Rose's daughter Jenny. Also I give..to my said grandson Jasper Sutton two hundred acres of land lying on Granney's quarter Creek in the county afore-said originally granted by Patent unto John Belton? commonly called the Hickory Ridge...

"I give and bequeth to my granddaughter Elizabeth Sutton, daughter of Richard, one negro wench named Suke, one negro boy named February, and one negro girl named Jenny, daughter of Rose, and all the issues of the females...also one feather bed and furniture"

"Also my will is that all the property given and bequeathed to the children of Richard Sutton remain and continue in the hands and care of my executors and none other untill the legatees become of age, unless in the case the legatees marrying my executors think convenient to give it up to them or any of them sooner and incase either of the said children should die without lawful issuetheir part to be equally divided between the surviving ones, and in case they should all die with out heirs, then the whole of their parts to be equally divided amongst all the children of my daughter Sarah Ross.."

"...all my estate real and personal not ...equeathed be sold by my executors at such time and in such manner as they shall think most proper and..after paying all my debts..the balance remaining .. to be equally divided amongst all my legatees"

Your orator further states that some previous to this will their Grandfather had made another will in which negro Abraham was bequeathed to your orator, Jasper Sutton; that after the date of that will, he sold Abraham to one Hickman of whom he had conditionally purchased the father of said Abraham, but whom he returned ...his not liking said negro, and the contract was cancelled., and their grandfather intended in lieu of Abraham to give your orator Jasper another negro by the name of Adam, both of whom were the sons of Rose. To that effect and no other..he made another will which is the one in question. He had Jonathan Sutton one of his executors draw up the other will....and directed him to make it like the former except with the before mentioned change.

Through mistake he wrote the last will in the same workds of the former and the said testor not knowing the said mistake and believing said Adam was inserted ..which was necessary to make the share of your orator Jasper equal to his sister which was the intention of their grandfather..signed the same....Shortly after he died.

..Their grandfather died of a large personal and real estate not bequeathed... There was a large sum in the hands of the executors after the payment of debts to be distributed to the legatees, eleven in number including your orator and oratrix.

George Ross well knowing Adam was intended to be bequeathed to your orator and and knowing the mistake...gave away Adam to his son for the purpose of defeating your orator's claim....

Now many years after the death of said testor..George Ross removed from South Carolina to the State of Tennessee and now resides in Dickson..that George himself had possession of the claims which were bequeathed to your orator..to wit: Rose and her children Adam, Menia?, Beck and Nance, also Sibb and Anacha her child..which were bequeathed to your orator Jasper..and said wench named Suke and her children, Patty, Mariah, Miah, Clare, also February and Jenny for many years and was in the habit of hiring them out and receiving large sums for their hire...some not less than eight dollars per annum...

After said negro wench named Rose had been hired out for many years by this said George Ross and at the time of child birth caught cold and died, an accident in all probabilities would not have happened had she not been hired out or had proper care had been taken of her.

Your orators further state that after they become of age which was the first time they discovered the fraud which had been practiced on them by said George, about two years ago, they made out their account against said George Ross for the money he received to their use for their distributed share of their Grandfathers estate which was sold....

George asked them not to sue and suggested a arbitrator ...the orators agreed... arbitrators were at length chosen...he still would not give them the legacy from their grandfathers will....

Answer of George Ross Senr filed 27th January 1817:

..It is true that Jasper Sutton of Kershaw County in the State of South Carolina made and executed his last will and testament on the 26th day of November 1791.

A few months after that time he died...a copy of the will annexed... this respondent with Jonathan Sutton and John Chesnut were appointed executors, all at that time of the State of South Carolina...all were duly proven... He does not believe the testor intended to bequeath Adam to Jasper Sutton.

Adam was killed by a fall from a horse long previous to the time Jasper became twenty one....Even if a mistake had been made he could not rectify it as Adam had been killed accordingly.

Rose came into his possession sometime in the year 1792. He fed, clothed, and took care of her and her children. Long before Jasper became twenty one Rose fell out of bed. This respondent used all manner of means for her recovery. He called in a physician of considerable emenence in the neighbourhood ..all in vain. He never hired Rose out more than two or three times and then for short periods.

Sibb came into his possession about sometime in 1792..she was about two or three years old. She was clothed, fed, and raised by this respondent.

Jenny was quite a child at the time of the will, but she died shortly after the testor. (Bequeathed to Betsy Sutton)

Suke (bequeathed to Elizabeth) came to this respondent in 1792. Since that time she has had four children all of whom were fed, clothed and cared for at the expence and trouble of this respondent.

February was about three years old when he came into the hands of this respondent. He raised the boy.

Suke was hired out for only a short time..if at all. None of the other hired out except perhaps February for a few week cutting cord wood for Bell Furnace.

He delivered to Elizabeth Furgason and her husband Rogal the negroes to which they were entitled on the day after their intermarriage which was about the day of _____ 180_. Within a short time after this he delivered to Jasper his possessions..long before Jasper attained the age of twenty one.

It was with surprise that this respondent saw on the Bill of Complaint that he was charged with the hire of said negroes amounting to between five and six thousand dollars. Actually the negroes were an expense to him.....

Decree : This cause having been heardappeared that the complainants were entitled from the proceeds of the personal estate of Jasper Sutton deceased by virtue of his last will and testament to the sum of One hundred and thirty two dollars and thirty two and 1/4 cents from the rents and proceeds of the sale of the real estate of the said Jasper deceased by virtue of said will which was sold by said defendants and the proceeds of which were received previous to 1809, and it further appearing that the hiring of complainants slaves and the interest of said money there is exhausted by the charges and expenses of raising and supporting said complainants and their slaves and that of money due said complainant Sutton for the sale of said estate which was received previous to said year 1809 (no subsequent sales or proceeds being taken into consideration) divers payments were made by defendant to and for the use of said complainant and Sutton which left a balance due to him in the year 1809 of \$67.83 1/2 which with the interest thereon since that period amounts to one hundred and ten dollars and twenty four and 1/4 cents for which he is indebted to a decree.

And that the monies due said Furgason in right of his wife for her share of said estate sold previous to 1809 and which have been collected have since been paid by said defendants to and for the use of said Furgason and his wife.

It is therefore ordered and decreed that said Bill be dismissed as regards Furgason and wife at the costs of complainant Furgason and wife and that the defendants pay complainant Sutton One hundred and ten dollars and twenty four and 1/4 cents and that George Ross pay the costs as to complainant Suttons upto the time of taking the first report in this cause inclusive thereof and that complainant Sutton pay the residue of the costs.
